


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EU's climate leadership at risk: rising emissions

➤ Global increase of 1,4%, after 3 years of stagnation:




- Robust economic growth;
- Lower fossil-fuel prices;
- Weaker energy efficiency efforts;
- ➤ Regional differences: -0,5% in the US., +1,7% in China, +1,5% in the EU


- EU represents 7,8% of total global installed coal fired power generation capacity




- Stagnating demand: -0,5% in 2017
- Since peaking year (2012), coal-based power gen. decreased by only 6,7 percentage points

Electricity generation from coal sources (% of total) in 2016




